The 1 Opening

Description of the opening

- 1) 12-14; balanced
- 2) 12+; club suit
- 3) 12-17; 4-4-1-4
- 4) 18+; any ("Strong Club")

The strength of the opening is the same at all vulnerabilities (at least 12 points).

This opening third in hand should not be much weaker (assume at least 11 points).

Contra-indications to opening with a Strong Club

5-5 major-minor hands are difficult to describe with a Strong Club opening. With borderline strength (17 points) I suggest opening with the major.

When to use Strong Club

Hands with 6 in a major and 4 in a minor are well suited for a Strong Club opening. With borderline strength (17 points) I suggest you open 1♠.

Hands with 5-4 or longer in the majors can be well described using the Strong Club. With borderline strength I suggest you open 1♠.

The motto of the Polish Club 2020 Expert system is: 'Bid aggressively with an offensive hand, keep quiet with a defensive hand.' Non-vulnerable one-level light openings and responses are introduced here. But the main merit of the Polish Club, i.e. to 'keep an eye on the total strength of the bidders', is still preserved.

In comparison to other versions of Polish Club (including Polish Club 2020 Standard), the meaning of the 2C opening has been changed. The Precision approach has been dropped, and replaced by the major two-suiter. This treatment, added to weak two-suited openings, makes the system's two-level openings very aggressive. And this brings IMPs and matchpoints!

The list of useful additional conventions in uncontested and competitive auctions is richer than in any other version of the Polish Club system. Some novel ideas (such as Cheap Transfer) are universal enough to be applied in any bidding system.
