Preface

The world does not stand still. Bridge systems are no different. In 2005 I published a book "WJ 2005 – a modern version of Polish Club".

What was modern 8 years ago, is prehistoric now. **Polish Club International** absorbs modern solutions from other systems and puts them into the frame of a "two-way" 1. opening.

The book is intended for two groups of readers:

- those interested in Polish Club
- those who want to get better understanding of trendy bidding treatments.

The book is divided into two parts:

- 1) Polish Club International Standard; this is a result of an Internet survey among Polish Club users
- 2) Polish Club International Pro; this part describes modern bidding tendencies approved all over the world systematized in one cohesive system.

Two features distinguish this book from other manuals on bridge systems and conventions:

- 1) Quizzes every new piece of information ends with a quiz. Cover the right column of a quiz table before finding your answer to the question given in the left column.
- 2) Slam bidding the conventions are explained by showing examples of mistakes made by bridge champions.

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Polish Club Survey

The questions posed in the survey are listed below. For each question, the solution chosen by the majority of users is indicated.

Survey Questions and Answers

Openings

- 1. 1♦ Opening
 - a. 4+ cards
 - b. Usually 5+ cards 4 only with a 3-suited hand or 5 clubs

PCI Standard: (B) 1♦ opening is generally 5+ cards

- 2. 1NT Opening
 - a. 5 card major allowed
 - b. 5 card major not allowed

PCI Standard: (A) 1NT opening allow a 5-crd major

- 3. 4♣ and 4♦ Openings
 - a. Natural
 - b. Show a strong hand with solid ♥/♠

PCI Standard: (A) 4♣/4♦ openings are natural

Responses

- 4. 2NT response to 1♣ opening
 - a. Nonforcing: 11-12 no 4 card major
 - b. GF: 13+ no 4 card major

PCI Standard: (A) 2NT response to 1♣ opening is nonforcing

- 5. 3NT response to 1♣ opening
 - a. Does Not Exist would not allow intelligent auctions over strong 1♣ variant
 - b. 13-15 no 4 card major

PCI Standard: (B) 3NT response to 1♣ is allowed and shows 13-15 no 4 card major

- 6. 2♥/2♠ responses to 1♠ opening
 - a. Natural, strong
 - b. Artificial e.g. used to transfer NT declarership to the strong hand

PCI Standard: (A) 2√/2♠ responses to 1♠ are natural

- 7. Over a 1♦ opening, a jump to 3♦ is:
 - a. Preemptive (up to 7 HCP)
 - b. Constructive (7-9 HCP)

PCI Standard: (A) Jump to 3♦ is preemptive

- 8. 2♥/2♠ response to 1♦ opening
 - a. Natural, strong
 - b. 5-4 majors minimum/invite (Reverse Flannery)

PCI Standard: (A) 2♥/2♠ response are natural, strong

- 9. 1NT response to 1 of a major opening
 - a. Nonforcing
 - b. Forcing, may contain 3fit limit raise

PCI Standard: (A) a 1NT response to 1 of a major is non-forcing

- 10. 2/1 response (e.g. 1♠-2♠)
 - a. Game-forcing
 - b. Game-forcing except if suit rebid after a weak rebid by opener

PCI Standard: (B) a 2 over 1 response is not forcing to game

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- 11. 2♥ response to 1♠
 - a. Game-forcing
 - b. Game-forcing except if suit rebid after weak rebid by opener

PCI Standard: (B) the 2 over 1 response is not forcing to game

- 12. 2NT response to 1♥/1♠
 - a. Game-forcing raise
 - b. Limit raise

PCI Standard: (B) 2NT over 1♥/1♠ is a limit raise

- 13. Over a 1M opening, a jump to $3 \clubsuit / 3 \spadesuit$ is:
 - a. Game-forcing natural, good 6+crd suit, slammish
 - b. Artificial raise

PCI Standard: (A) A jump to 3♣/3♦ over 1M is natural and gameforcing

- 14. Over a 1M opening,
 - a. We play one splinter
 - b. We play splinters and mini-splinters

PCI Standard: (B) Over 1M we play splinters and mini-splinters

- 15. Over a 1N opening
 - a. 2N is a transfer to diamonds
 - b. 2N is natural invite

PCI Standard: (B) Over an opening 1N, 2N is natural

- 16. Over a 2♣ (Precision) opening
 - a. 2N is natural
 - b. 2N is a transfer to 3♣

PCI Standard: (B) Over a 2♠ opening 2N is a transfer to 3♣
